

**Remarks by Ambassador HAYASHI Hajime  
for the JET Reunion Reception  
on 3 March 2023**

It is wonderful to welcome all of you in person at our Embassy. It has been three years since we had a face-to-face reception like this.

Today we have with us some 30 ex-JET participants who have returned to the UK since the pandemic. Welcome back! We also have almost a hundred JET alumni who have already developed distinguished careers after taking part in the programme.
