Ambassador's Commendation to the UK-Japan Music Society

Distinguished Guests,

Good evening and welcome to the Embassy of Japan.

The UK-Japan Music Society, which was founded by Mr Jonathan Gregory in 1992, has promoted musical exchange between the UK and Japan through numerous concerts over the past 30 years.
