

Remarks by H.E. Mr. HAYASHI Hajime,
Ambassador of Japan to the UK,
at ‘Celebrating 5 Years of Japan House London’
on 21st Sep 2023

Distinguished Guests,

It is a great pleasure to celebrate the fifth anniversary of Japan House London together with all of you.

In 2018 JHL opened in Kensington, one of the liveliest areas in London, and was honoured by the presence of the then HRH The Duke of Cambridge, the current Prince William, at the grand opening ceremony. Since its opening, JHL has been the most important and successful organisation in promoting Japan in not only London and the UK, but also Europe and beyond. It has attracted a wide audience, from Japan connoisseurs to passers-by including those visiting London from other countries.

All of this is aimed at presenting answers to the big question of 'what Japan is' from a variety of perspectives.

May I extend my sincere gratitude to the corporate partners, trustees, steering committee members, non-executive directors, staff and particularly all frequent visitors to JHL for your bottomless support for this unparalleled place. JHL is a platform for cultural exchanges and mutual understanding between people of the UK and Japan and a symbol of the promising ties between the two countries.
